

WHAT IS A TOWN COUNCIL?

We are aware that not everyone knows what a Town Council is, or what it does. Well, town and community councils provide the first and most local tier of local government. Their members are closest to the communities they represent. They act as a bridge between the community and higher levels of government, advocating for the specific needs and priorities of the town or community they represent.

Blaenavon Town Council is not to be confused with Torfaen County Borough Council. It is a separate legal entity. Torfaen County Borough Council is a 'principal authority' and covers Blaenavon, Pontypool and Cwmbran, as well as the surrounding villages. It delivers most services and has a much broader range of responsibilities, including education, social services, highways, planning and development, waste management, economic development, and major infrastructure projects. It deals with matters that affect the entire borough and is responsible for coordinating and providing major public services.

By contrast, Blaenavon Town Council, as a town or community council, is much smaller, with more limited powers and financial resources. Nevertheless, it is a voice for the local community and can deliver projects, events and initiatives that contribute to local wellbeing, as well as providing funding and support to organisations and community groups. Increasingly, the Welsh Government is keen for town councils to grow and become more ambitious and take on what are known as 'place-based services' by transferring community assets and services from the principal authority.

WHAT DOES A TOWN COUNCILLOR DO?

Councillors are here to ensure that you have a voice in how our town is run and that your needs and concerns are heard. Councillors make decisions on setting and spending the council's budget and input into the planning process and on other matters that affect the community.

But it's not just about decision-making. Our councillors also work hard to improve our town's well-being and promote community involvement. They put together community events, lend support to local organisations, and talk to other local authorities and government bodies on behalf of Blaenavon residents.

Town councillors are unsalaried, only receiving a small allowance to cover the costs of their duties. Many of our town councillors have full-time jobs and work or volunteer in the community in addition to their role as councillors. They are public servants who are dedicated to making Blaenavon a better place.

THE COUNCIL OFFICERS

Blaenavon Town Council also employs three diligent officers to help keep things running smoothly. We have a Chief Officer who performs the dual roles of Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer; an Assistant Chief Officer; and a Community Wellbeing Development Officer. Without their expertise and hard work, it would be impossible to maintain the level of services that the council currently offers.

KEEPING BLAENAVON TIDY!

Blaenavon Town Councillors and officers, alongside local volunteers, have rolled up their sleeves to keep Blaenavon tidy through a series of litter picks. The council has targeted several areas of Blaenavon. In recent months, litter picks have taken place at Broad Street, Garn-yr-Erw, Elgam Green, Hillside Avenue, Llanfoist Crescent, Bowen Close, Ael-Y-Bryn, Gilchrist Thomas Industrial Estate, Upper Coed Cae, Giles Road and the surrounding areas. Through these collective efforts, over 100 sacks of rubbish have been collected.

Whilst it has been a great effort by all involved, it is always disappointing to see how much litter has been dumped around Blaenavon. By taking pride in our town, and disposing of waste correctly, we will all benefit from a cleaner and more pleasant environment. COMMUNITY GROUPS SUPPORTED THROUGH GRANT FUNDING

In 2022/23, £67,186 has been donated to fifteen local community groups through the Community Brew Participatory Budget project administered by Blaenavon Town Council and funded in partnership with Torfaen County Borough Council, Aneurin Bevan University Health Board and Bron Afon Housing Association. This included grants to Forge Side RFC Community Garden to create a community event space; Bethlehem Chapel for initiatives to help combat loneliness and isolation within the community; Blaenavon Blues AFC to help improve the ground for community use; and to the Garnsychan Partnership to support the community via the Pantry Community Shop and Kitchen.

As of September 2023, the Blaenavon Town Council has also provided £9,610 in grants and sponsorship as part of its Small Grants Scheme in 2023.

BLAENAVON CELEBRATES THE KING'S CORONATION

In May, Blaenavon Town Council worked in partnership with Forgeside RFC and Blaenavon World Heritage Centre to put on a range of celebrations to mark the coronation of His Majesty King Charles III. On 4 May, the Mayor raised the Coronation Flag at Blaenavon Cenotaph, alongside the volunteers of the Royal British Legion, and a weekend of celebrations followed.

On 7 May a 'Coronation Big Lunch' was held at Forgeside RFC, featuring live music, entertainment for all ages, and a jubilant atmosphere. The event also marked the first anniversary of the Forgeside Community Garden, highlighting the collective efforts of Forgeside RFC and local volunteers. The celebrations continued on 8 May with the Blaenavon Coronation Fair at Blaenavon World Heritage Centre where residents could escape the bad weather, listen to brilliant performances by Blaenavon Male Voice Choir, take part in an array of coronation-themed craft activities and shop at a range of well-stocked craft stalls provided by GW Crafters.

Blaenavon Town Council also supplied free street decoration packs for residents to hold local street parties. A children's poetry competition was held at Blaenavon Heritage VC Primary School and Blaenavon Town Councillors were delighted to attend a special assembly to present each winner with an annual magazine subscription for their fantastic poems, a certificate, and a water bottle. Shops and businesses around Blaenavon were also tastefully decorated for the coronation and Blaenavon Town Council was pleased to award Green Gables Grazing the prize for best-dressed shop window.

Despite some challenging weather conditions, the Blaenavon Country and Western Fayre on 12 August at Broad Street Car Park turned out to be a successful event. BLAENAVON TOWN COUNCIL SUPPORTS YOUNG PEOPLE WITH HOLIDAY FUN

Blaenavon Town Council has been actively supporting youth activities this year. In partnership with Torfaen Play, the council has funded Play and Wellbeing Camps in Blaenavon during school holidays, ensuring a safe and supportive environment for children. These camps, catering for ages 5-11, promote positive wellbeing through activities that encourage social connection, physical activity, mindfulness, learning, and kindness. Children engage in games, arts and crafts, sports, and more, fostering skills, friendships, and self-confidence. Nutritious packed lunches are also provided.

In addition to the camps, the council has offered various activities during school breaks, including an Easter Digital Heritage Trail, Halloween pumpkin carving, Animals Interactive sessions, free cooking sessions with Cook Stars, and the Blaenavon Summer Music Project with Rec Rock. The council has also supported free paddleboarding sessions with Black Crow Paddleboarding and skateboarding sessions with Torfaen Sports Development, as well as Teen Gym Sessions for young people.



FREE COMMUNITY SWIMMING SESSIONS

Blaenavon has, unfortunately, been without a swimming pool since 2007. However, Blaenavon Town Council is determined to assist residents in accessing swimming facilities. Recently, scores of Blaenavon residents have attended a series of community swimming sessions at the Pontypool Active Living Centre. Blaenavon Town Council hired a bus to take residents to Pontypool free of charge, while Torfaen Leisure Trust provided free and private access to the swimming sessions for Blaenavon residents. These community swimming events have proven to be a resounding success, with attendees offering fantastic feedback. For many, it was a valuable opportunity to socialise with fellow community members while engaging in healthy exercise. Keep an eye out for future community activities and events.



FAMILY OF BLAENAVON IS CELEBRATED

Blaenavon Town Council was delighted to co-sponsor, along with the Forged Solutions Group, an exhibition and book by renowned south Wales photographer Walter Waygood. No stranger to Blaenavon, Walter had a photography studio in Blaenavon during the 1970s and took many photographs of Blaenavon and its residents during the 1970s and 1980s. He has turned his lens on Blaenavon once more and has taken a series of photographs depicting life in the town during the 2020s.

The exhibition was launched at a well-attended event at the Workmen's Hall in July 2023, attended by the Mayor Cllr Nathan Matthews alongside Nick Thomas-Symonds MP and Blaenavon Rugby Internationals Terry Cobner and John Perkins, who all gave speeches. The work was exhibited at the Workmen's Hall until October. An accompanying book entitled The Family of Blaenafon is also available to purchase from the Workmen's Hall and the Blaenavon World Heritage Centre.

Blaenavon Town Council also funded a series of photography workshops held by Walter with the Blaenavon World Heritage Youth Ambassadors at the Hwb Youth Club in Broad Street. Some of this excellent work also featured in the exhibition and book.



TOWNSCAPE HERITAGE GRANTS SUPPORT TOWN CENTRE REGENERATION

The former Market Tavern public house and the former butchers' shop at 24 Broad Street are the latest properties to receive funding from the Blaenavon Townscape Heritage Programme (THP). The Blaenavon THP, which has received over £1.2 million from The National Lottery Heritage Fund and is also supported by Torfaen Council, Blaenavon Town Council, Cadw and the private sector, provides grant funding for buildings within the Blaenavon Conservation Area that are in urgent need of comprehensive heritage-based restoration and refurbishment. The recent grant awards follow previous Blaenavon THP investment into the nearby Bethlehem Chapel, HM Stores and The Hwb. THP projects were identified as high priority in the original submission to the National Lottery Heritage Fund in 2018.

Cllr Nathan Matthews, Mayor of Blaenavon, said: "I am delighted to see work begin on these important and much-needed projects. The Market Tavern, in particular, has been an eyesore for many years...





...This, along with the other projects, will enhance Broad Street, improve its appeal, and hopefully attract more business and vitality to our town."

Torfaen County Borough Councillor Joanne Gauden, Executive Member for Economy, Skills and Regeneration, said: "This is great news for Blaenavon town centre. We know local residents have been keen to see the Market Tavern brought back to life for many years. Blaenavon is a conservation area and Broad Street is home to some beautiful original Victorian shopfronts. The renovation projects will use traditional materials in keeping with the town's heritage and preserve as many of the original features as possible."
